The Fellowship provides an opportunity to gain postdoctoral experience in cancer research, consolidate research skills and, if applicable, complete your specialist training programme.

Applications are not restricted to Members or Fellows of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow. However, there will be an expectation that the successful candidate acknowledges fully the support provided and contributes to the work of the College in the future

We will provide:

- Up to 4 years support (dependent on stage reached in career)
- Salaries for the fellow and a research assistant
- Consumable costs
- Potentially renewable for a further four years

- You will hold a specialist training post or be of Consultant status / obtained your CCT
- You will have obtained a higher degree in a cancer-relevant research area
- Have completed or have no more than 2 years full time specialist training to complete by the time you intend to take up the award
- Cancer Research UK is also keen to support the broader development of its fellows, through opportunities for training, regular fellows' meetings and working overseas.

### **William and Elizabeth Davies**

William Ernest Davies was born in Wishaw in 1912 and died in 2002. His steel-worker father died when William was five months old when he and his mother went to live with his grandparents. Employed by the Burgh of Wishaw as a meat inspector, he was seconded to the Admiralty at the outbreak of World War II. He married his wife Elizabeth, a trained nurse from High Blantyre, in 1942 and William's work kept them overseas in Ceylon and Hong Kong, before finally settling in Malta. They had no children and when Elizabeth died in 1995, they had been married for 53 years.
