I have also been able to appreciate the delivery of objectives were met medical education in a different part of the world. In addition to this, the distinctive characteristic within South Africa of having a burden of surgical disease that reflects what is typical in both a high-income country (e.g. cancer and chronic conditions) and a lowincome country (e.g. trauma and diseases of an infectious aetiology) has broadened my knowledge and understanding of the management of these cases in both an emergency and elective setting. I was fortunate enough o be able to rotate through both paediatric and adult plastic

I was fortunate enough o be able to rotate through both paediatric and adult plastic surgery theatre cases and participate in the post-op management of patients, including splinting, wound care and rehabilitation. I also observed how a lack of sterilised theatre linen delayed, and on occasion, resulted in patients' operations being postponed.

During clinic consultations I have also witnessed the considerable psychological impact of stigma resulting from conditions such as microstomia, facial contractures secondary to burns and naso-labial crease prominence.

#### **Evaluation**

How has this scholarship/award impacted on your clinical/NHS practice or equivalent? My elective in plastic surgery has given me the opportunity to experience surgical care overseas and I have had numerous opportunities to develop my surgical skills in wound closure that I may otherwise not have had in the UK. I have also had exposure to a wide range of pathology and diversity in surgical cases that I may otherwise not have seen in the UK. As such, the experience has better prepared me to manage cases necessitating a plastic surgery review. Overall, I am convinced that this elective has improved my clinical, surgical and decision-making skills.
